MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING of St George the Martyr, Waterlooville, held on Sunday 29th April 2007 in the church and commencing at 11.15 am. There were 58 persons present. The Parish Priest, Fr Mike Sheffield, was in the Chair.

1. **WELCOME:** Fr Mike extended a warm welcome to everyone to the APCM at St George's. He explained that there are two meetings, the first for the parishioners and the second for the congregation.
2. **APOLOGIES** were received from Adrienne Bridger, Margaret and Susan Deal, Jaye Warren, Anne Willoughby, Norman and Audrey Linney, Janet and John Johnson, Sarah and Keith Lewis, Tasha Cook, Anna Richardson, Lesley Handy, Sue Palmer, Fiona Ross, Kiera Gregg, Sarah Hewett and Pat Winter.
3. **MEETING OF PARISHIONERS:** although in this parish we elect Churchwardens to serve for 4 years they still have to be re-elected yearly. There are therefore 2 nominations from Tony Rice-Oxley, proposed by Amanda Jones and seconded by David Palmer and from Margaret Symonds, proposed by Pam Dinneen and seconded by Jean Brice. The election of these two churchwardens was agreed unanimously. Fr Mike gave a vote of thanks for the huge amount of work that the churchwardens do during the year to make sure that St George's runs smoothly and efficiently.
4. **MEETING OF ELECTORAL ROLL MEMBERS:** Rosemary Monk who is the Electoral Roll Officer said that there were 164 parishioners on the Electoral Roll, of whom 54 were not resident within the parish. 8 were removed during the year through death and no-one officially asked to be removed from the roll. We have a thriving active electoral roll and we all need to encourage new people to go on the roll and any over 16 year olds. Rosemary has just been renewing the electoral roll which has to be done throughout the entire country every 6 years.
5. **MINUTES OF THE 2006 APCM AND MATTERS ARISING:** There being no amendments, the minutes were signed as a true and accurate record of the meeting. Proposed by Chris Culley and seconded by Colin Monk and agreed unanimously.
6. **PRESENTATION OF AUDITED ACCOUNTS AND TREASURER'S REPORT:** The financial overview for the year is included on the back of the Treasurer's report in the APCM report and full copies of the

financial statements are at the back of the church for anyone wanting these.

Carol said that as with the previous year, 2006's finances have been challenging with expenditure again exceeding income.

Without the generous donations of individuals and the hard work and dedication of fundraisers, the PCC would not be able to keep St George's Church and Hall running. It is hoped that where possible, those donations are reviewed regularly in line with rising costs and inflation.

Although we rely on the income from investments, we are constantly having to consider realising some of these funds. This would, of course, have an impact on monthly income.

To end, I would again like to thank our Auditors for examining the Accounts which will be signed off by Mr Feri Eshraghi of Morris Palmer on his return to work in due course. In the meantime, the acting independent auditor has confirmed the Accounts are in order. A copy of her covering letter is included in the full version of the Accounts.

Fr Mike said that the job of looking after the accounts for the church is a mammoth one. Carol does a fantastic job backed up by the Finance Committee. A big thank you to Carol and the Finance Committee. There were no questions on the accounts for Carol.

7. **ELECTION OF PCC MEMBERS:** First of all thanks to the PCC members who have met 11 times over the last year. The PCC is made up of Fr Mike, Chairman, 2 ex officio members Jane Cook as Secretary and Carol McKells as Treasurer, 2 Churchwardens, Tony Rice-Oxley and Margaret Symonds, 2 Deanery Synod representatives, Adrienne Bridger and Wendy Pearce, 9 elected PCC members – Adina Burton, David Cavey, Sandra Hewett, Yvonne Jones, Ian and Julie Long, Colin Monk, Anne Morgan and Denise Rosser and 2 co-opted members Dick Handy, Pastoral Chairman and Richard Spurgeon, Hall Chairman.

Goodbye and thank you to Sandra, Adina and Anne who have served for 2 or 3 years. Also goodbye to Ian and Julie Long who are looking to move on and worship in a different church. We wish them well and thank them for their work at St George's. We therefore need 5 new members to serve on the PCC, 3 for 3 years, 1 for 2 years and 1 for 1 year. 3 people filled in forms and volunteered to join the PCC – Richard Handy, proposed by Colin Monk, seconded by David Palmer,

David Palmer, proposed by Dick Handy, seconded by Margaret Symonds, Mabel Maginn, proposed by Margaret Symonds, seconded by Dick Handy. Fr Mike said we still need 2 more people to stand. Julia Spurgeon volunteered, proposed by Jane Rice-Oxley, seconded by Pam Dinneen and Abigail Morgan who only wishes to stand for one year before going to University, proposed by Lynda Sheffield and seconded by Mary Hutchings. Wendy Pearce said how nice it was to see a young person on the PCC – the first time in all her experience of the PCC.

8. **ELECTION OF SIDESPERSIONS:** Thanks were expressed to all the Sidespersons currently on the rotas. Dick Handy read out the list of sidespersons and Fr Mike asked for the list to be accepted in its entirety – proposed by David Palmer and seconded by Anne Morgan. Fr Mike asked whether there was anyone else who would like to be added to the sidespersons list. There were no nominations.

Rosemary Monk spoke about the Baptism visitors which has been set up this year. One visit to the family before the baptism to answer any questions they might have and then be in church on the Sunday for the baptism. Families are really pleased to see you and it's not an arduous job. Need a few more people to join the team. Training will be given plus a pack to anyone interested. If anyone is interested please see Rosemary.

9. **INDIVIDUAL REPORTS:**

Churchwardens: Full report in the APCM report. Tony said the only thing he needed to add was that finance is always uppermost in their minds. Made a huge push recently for people to consider their giving. A big thank you to those who have already increased their giving. If you haven't already done so I would urge you to think about this. There are several things we need to do but we don't really have the finances. Tony also urged people to let them know if there is anything around the church that needs doing.

Church Hall: running the Church Hall is not an easy task. Thank you to Richard Spurgeon for taking on the responsibility along with the hall committee. No questions were asked.

Mothers' Union: thriving.

Pastoral Committee: Andrew Clark said that mention had been made in church this morning about the successful Music Festival with 1400 people coming through the doors. He would like to point out

that over 1000 people a year come through the church hall through the University of the Third Age. This was set up 18 months ago in Waterlooville and originated in France around 1880 for retired people. There are a huge number of groups, including German, Tai Chi, poetry, French conversation to mention just a few. Andrew would like to know whether there could be some kind of service for them. Fr Mike said he would get Dick to put it on the agenda for the next Pastoral Committee.

Youth Coordinator and Child Protection: Sandra Hewett does both these jobs. Adina said that given the news in the last week it is a very important job to make sure that everyone who works with children in the church is cleared. Fr Mike gave a vote of thanks at this point to everyone in St George's who works with the youth groups.

Church Watch and Holy Dusters: Adina would like more people to volunteer for the Church Watch especially now that the church is open every day. Fr Mike said that if you are going to Asda to do your shopping pop into the church before you go to Asda and again afterwards just to make sure everything is ok.

Ladies Group, George's Men and Tweenies: these groups are all thriving in the church.

Walsingham Cell: thank you to Yvonne for all she does. Yvonne said she is sad to say that the Cell is not thriving with only 15 members. The Cell come together to meditate and use the rosary in a meaningful way to say thank you. Open to everyone who would like to join.

Church Flower Fund: Yvonne said they are struggling money wise. It takes a lot of money to decorate the church. She uses the market for the flowers which is cheaper than going to a wholesalers. There is £44 in the bank and £25 in petty cash for the next year so far. Any money donated through Carol can be gift aided. Thank you to Yvonne and her team for making the church look so beautiful week on week.

Bible Reading Fellowship: Linda Wainwright said the Bible Reading Fellowship provide a short text from the Bible together with notes. These come out 3 times a year. She can get copies any time of the year.

Deanery Synod: Adrienne is away and Wendy said that sadly she has been unable to attend any of the meetings this year as she has been away on each occasion but Adrienne has kept her up to date.

Koforidua - Winifred said she was shocked to see that item (c) to set up a proper stipend fund and payment system for the clergy who presently have to collect their stipend in person each month, sometimes travelling all the way to the diocesan office only to discover there are insufficient funds available to pay them has been shelved until costing is available. Tony said that he is Treasurer on the Deanery Synod so knows about this. This is the order in which the people in Ghana wished to proceed. Most of the churches in the deanery have given money towards it. You will see that this morning at the luncheon the raffle is being held in aid of Koforidua and Fr Mike said that in July there will be open house at the Vicarage with a raffle for this. Margaret explained that the whole of the Havant Deanery is linked to Koforidua but we support a church in a different parish – this is historical.

Magazine Committee: Fr Mike said he would like to pay tribute to Bill Hutchings for all he did – the magazine is what it is today because of what Bill did for it. John Johnson and his editorial team are now producing a magazine every two months. Tony said that he envisages the future of our magazine as being a free magazine and would like to see 1000 copies being pushed through letterboxes financed entirely by advertisements from about 2009 onwards.

Wendy Clark said that she would like magazines topped up in the rack in the church hall by the hatch as this is where visitors get their copy from. Wendy Pearce said that this is where some of the congregation collect their copy when available. Thanks were expressed to the Magazine Committee.

Servers: big thank you to the servers for their dedication. The Bishop was very complimentary about them last week.

Sunday School: big thank you to Julia Spurgeon for all she has done over the last 15 years. Julia is now concentrating more on the music and there are two team now in charge of Sunday School.

Youth Club/Link Group: Wendy Pearce said that she was sure she speaks for everyone when she says that she really values the input of the youth at the services. Yvonne Jones said it is lovely to see the young children looking so comfortable in church. They understand there is nothing to worry about coming to church.

Choir/Band: thanks to the choir and the band for all they do. Julia said they are changing choir practice night to a Thursday 6.30-7.30

pm to see if it attracts new people. Thanks should be expressed to Andrew, our organ scholar who turns up regularly. Yvonne Jones said how lovely the music is at St George's.

Social and Fundraising: They organise a huge amount of events during the year. It's nice to have the fellowship as well as the fundraising. Thank you to everyone involved with that. Please remember to support the Summer Fete which is taking place at the end of the music festival week.

100 Club: Colin said please keep contributing. Although not everyone is lucky it brings in a lot of money.

Traidcraft: Pam Dinneen reminded everyone that there are catalogues at the back of church and she is happy to take orders. Fair Trade refreshments are available all the time in the hall. Please keep supporting Fair Trade.

10. **APPOINTMENT OF INDEPENDENT EXAMINER:** Fr Mike asked if everyone is happy if we ask Feri Eshraghi from Morris Palmer to be our independent examiner again. A letter of thanks will be sent to them for doing the accounts this year. Agreed unanimously.

11. **COMMENTS FROM PARISH PRIEST:**
Richard Spurgeon asked Fr Mike to explain about his sabbatical. He said this will take place in the autumn and he will be leaving St George's for 10 Sundays. Every 15 years a priest is entitled to a sabbatical and this has to be suggested by the Archdeacon and Bishop. Half the time will be spent working on a paper "Why is it people need to go to places like Walsingham ". The second half will be a relaxing holiday with Lynda in New Zealand.

African Child Trust

Rachel Palmer wondered whether it would be possible for the young people at St George's to sponsor their own child. Tony said this was a wonderful idea but she would need to collect £150 each year with a guarantee for 4 years. The Youth Club already help to support a child. He would talk more to Rachel about it. There are photos on the board at the back of church.

Tony proposed a vote of thanks to Fr Mike and Lynda. He said the two of them are a driving force for all of us. Thank you so much to them both for all they do.

Committees

The PCC operates through a number of committees/groups, which meet between full meetings of the PCC.

Church Attendance

There were 156 parishioners on the Electoral Roll, of whom 63 were not resident within the parish. No changes were made to the roll during 2007. The average weekly attendance, counted during October 2007, was 90 adults and 5 children including weekday attendances, but this number increased at festivals.

Review of the Year

The full PCC met 10 times during the year, with an average attendance of 78%. Fabric, Finance, Pastoral, Kairos, Social and Fundraising and Hall sub-committees continued to meet in the interim, to enable items to be discussed in more detail, and reported back to the full PCC. The PCC will continue to invite outgoing Churchwardens to remain on the PCC for a further year to provide continuity.

Comprehensive budget accounts continue to be handed out at the PCC meetings when the Treasurer is on hand to answer any questions.

We have supported over 21 wide-ranging charities, both at home and overseas, in particular £612.04 to the Children's Society (a large part of which came from a very successful Christingle Service on Christmas Eve), and continued support of four children under the African Child Trust Scheme. Other benefiting charities included Naomi House, Biblelands, USPG, Bishop's Lent Appeal, Mission Aviation, Koforidua, Cathedral Development Appeal, Macmillan Cancer Support, Leprosy Mission, Away From It All (AFIA), Sense, St George's Baghdad (£616.65), St Lukes Hospital for the Clergy, Canine Partners, 2 Saints Centres, Bible Society, Salvation Army and Brooke Hospital for Sick Animals. Some of these charities were supported by the Wednesday Coffee Morning collections. Money was constantly being raised for church funds over the year, in particular £2511 at the Summer Fete, £1798.27 at the Christmas Bazaar, £3250 from the St George's Charity Shop and £3610.76 from the sale of plants, bulbs and votives throughout the year.

The giving through envelopes and banker's orders has increased to £32,583.05, excluding tax. The tax recovered on all Gift Aid donations for the year was £8,350.50. £756, excluding tax, was raised on the St George's Day Gift Day. Contributions on the collection plate raised £1,777.58.

£88,297.94 was spent to provide the Christian Ministry from St. George's Church, including the full contribution to the parish share of £48,441, an increase of 6.46%. Our remaining fund balances are invested with the CBF Church of England Investment and Deposit funds.

Dr Feri Eshraghi, FCA, examined the accounts for 2006 and very kindly agreed to continue for 2007.

The following has happened during the course of the year and most will be written about in more detail in the following reports:

- Fr Mike and Lynda were away from St George's for 3 months as Fr Mike was on sabbatical and we were lucky to have Fr Ray to step in
- The Parish breakfasts were still very popular and will continue
- Kairos – several services have been held around the partnership churches of Christ Church, Portsdown, All Saints, Denmead, Church of the Good Shepherd, Crookhorn, St John's Purbrook and St George's this year. A successful Kairos Barn Dance was held in October at St George's.
- Waterloo Music Festival – another very successful festival was held in June
- A Christmas concert was held on 29th November with 4 schools taking part. This year there was no switching on of the Christmas lights ceremony in Waterloo but it was decided to go ahead with the concert as it is very good outreach and we had a very good attendance.
- Pastoral Visitors Groups for baptism and post funeral visits continued
- The Travelling Nativity again went round the parish during advent and was very popular. A big thank you to Sue Andrews for knitting a new set this year and for continuing to knit angels for each family to keep.

Treasurer's Report 2007

Incorporating all the Church group finances with the main Church and Hall Accounts, the final figures show an overspend of £3720. If depreciation at 2% amounts to £3252, the overspend reduces to £469.

For a second year St George's hosted the Waterloo Music Festival and the PCC received a very generous donation of £525 from that source. Other major donations received included £593.56 from the 100 Club and £400 from the Social and Fundraising Committee. Also donated to the General Account was £400 from Friday Coffee Morning fundraising, £520 from the Charities Aid, £410 sponsorship donation and £1200 towards replacing Church Hall heaters.

Donations from Planned Giving exceeded the budget by over £1360 for which we received £8350 in Gift Aid tax recovery (a slight increase on 2006 of £116). Interest on bank and building society accounts amounted to a modest £16 and the value of PCC investments amounted to £66,285, for which £2,558 was received as dividends. Dividends earned on the Church Hall Deposit Account were re-invested and the current value of that account now stands at £6,286.

The fete, bazaar and other fundraising again exceeded expectations by over £3,800, as did the sale of plants etc by over £2,000. Charity giving exceeded £4,600 and we have supported a wide range of Charities both at home and overseas. Funds generated by the Wednesday Coffee Mornings have also supported a variety of Charities together with donations to the main PCC and Church Hall Accounts.

The budget for 2007 was again very tight. It is always difficult to predict income based on the generosity of those who support St George's Church, against the knowledge that expenditure will always increase each year. Forming a realistic budget will always be a difficult task which will hopefully guide us through the year which I feel happened in 2007. My thanks go to the Fabric and Finance Committee for all the work they put in and also for the support of the PCC.

On behalf of St George's Church, my thanks are due to Feri Eshraghi of Jackson Green Chartered Accountants for examining the Accounts for another year without charge. A summary of the Accounts is shown overleaf and the full version is displayed on the Church notice board. Copies are available on request.

Churchwardens Report 2007

2007 was a challenging year for St George's. We hosted the second Waterloo Music Festival, our Priest had a 3 month sabbatical and we continued to enjoy a great many social and fundraising activities.

The year has seen our Sunday School grow. With a current membership of about 15 it is good to see 10 of these as regular attenders. The youth club remains popular with the number fairly constant at 25 and the Link group is increasing in numbers. Many thanks to all those who give up their time to organise these activities.

Our various groups have been very active during the year. From Tweenies to George's Men, Mothers Union to Thursday market. Our social activities cover a wide range of events.

We are pleased to report that the congregation at St George's continues to grow. However numbers at midnight communion and Easter Day were slightly down on previous years. This seems to be quite dependant upon when Easter falls and upon which day of the week Christmas falls. Third Sundays, when youth are encouraged to attend, provide a very full church. In the sabbatical months of October and November the Youth club presided over the presentations giving them a full and active role in the service which they appreciated.

Our social calendar was packed with a variety of interesting and enterprising activities many of which raised much needed funds. Beginning the year with the West End Premiere show, we also had a travelling supper, a Strawberry Sparkle and a dog race evening with an excellent curry. We continue to provide teas and coffees on several days of the week and the quarterly church breakfast is very popular. We teamed up with our other Kairos partnership churches in September to host a barn dance. One new development is a monthly film club which provides a venue for showing a popular film with a break for tea and biscuits.

2007 was a most successful year for fundraising. Apart from the standard activities such as the bazaar and summer fete, the "shop" provided a huge boost to funds raising over £3,000. Grateful thanks are due to the many people who helped with this successful fund raiser. Any report on fundraising would have to include the fantastic work done by our plant sales team. Standing outside in all weathers they manage to make a huge contribution to our fundraising efforts (though their figures are obscured within the "sales" heading of the annual report).

The church building is ageing. Rebuilt in 1970 it is beginning to show signs of wear and tear. Movement of a picture from the wall shows the fading paintwork and several cracks are beginning to appear in the stonework. The two large fore and aft cracks along the floor are beginning to cause worries and will have to receive a professional investigation in the near future. 2008 sees the quinquennial inspection and the architects may well insist on works being carried out in these areas. We have renewed the closing mechanisms on one of the front doors and repaired many damaged glass panes. Our grounds are attractive and well used in the summer months. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the teams of church cleaners and church grounds maintenance who give of their time to keep these areas up to the mark.

As mentioned the church hosts the Waterloo Music Festival and received income from the hire of the church. This year saw a magnificent programme of music ranging from a string quartet to local choirs, a rock evening (during which the entire church was stripped of all pews for the first time since 1970) and a fantastic Last Night of the Proms. We are very proud to host these events from the WMF and look forward to continuing to do so.

We have teamed up with our fellow partnership churches and the Churchwardens and Priests meet regularly to exchange best practice and to organise joint social and worship events. This is one result coming out of the Kairos initiative.

During the sabbatical we were very fortunate to have the services of Fr Ray Chapman who kept all the regular services going, as well as covering other worship activities, such as the Bishops initiative in having a regular weekly prayer hour during Advent.

The church hall continues to thrive as a centre for church activities as well as a centre for outreach. Under new management the regular events have been supplemented by others so that it is quite hard to book a date now without a clash occurring! However the hall is rapidly approaching its centenary and some hard decisions will have to be made soon as to its future. A committee has been set up to discuss this and to produce a plan for the next 100 years!

It goes without saying that there are a great many people to be thanked. The church would not keep going without the small band of volunteers dedicated to organising social events, cleaning the church, and assisting as Sidesmen, Servers, Choir, Band, Verger, Sacristan, Organist, Flower arrangers, various committee members, PCC and many more, far too many to mention by name.

No Churchwardens report would be complete without reference to our financial situation. In essence this was a really good year with incredible fundraising figures and an approximate balance in our expectation of giving. Giving to our selected charities in 2007 was £4600 which equates to approximately 15% of our general giving. Our final profit or loss is adversely affected this year by the hall accounts where new fires had to be bought at a cost of some £6000 (less some very generous donations), and the ever present hall depreciation which was £3252 this year.

It will always be essential for Churchwardens to encourage their congregations to consider an increase in their regular giving each year and this year is no exception. It is easy to do nothing, particularly when one is giving by standing order, as this involves an instruction to the bank which often gets put off to another day. Please consider doing this if you have not actioned any change for this year.

The success of any church is very dependant upon it's clergy and here we are very lucky to have the services of Fr Mike and Fr Ray. Mike is active in all areas and it is no coincidence that year-on-year figures for attendance are on the increase with the exciting and different services organised. We are grateful that Mike is well supported by Fr Ray. Finally we say a big thank you to Lynda Sheffield for her support and encouragement to both Mike and the congregation.

Both Churchwardens would like to say thank you to the congregation for their support over the past year and we trust that this lengthy report has covered all aspects of our church's life.

The hall has settled a number of accounts for repairs this year. The largest being for the replacement of two of the gas fires in the main hall. The committee is very grateful for the financial donations received towards that work. During the year there were two separate repairs to the roof following slippage of slate tiles. Despite these expenses the hall has 'broken even' this year.

The committee aspires to a financial surplus and to be in a position to make a net monetary contribution to the wider Parish finances. Sadly again this year that has not been possible. This should not be mistaken for not contributing to the Parish. The hall provides a serviced meeting place for regular Youth events, coffee mornings, the Church fete and Christmas Bazaar and, through it's flexible pricing structure, it encourages positive outreach and charity activities.

The PCC is quite properly resolved to considering the longer term future of the Hall over the coming months. When the opportunity arises please make sure that your views are given to those involved in the steering group in the appropriate format.

Deanery Synod Report

This year there were only three meetings as there had been insufficient items of business to make a worthwhile agenda for the February meeting.

Consequently, the June meeting at Blendworth had an agenda of 15 items which made for a long evening. As a point of interest this was the 150th meeting of Havant Deanery Synod and the first item on the Agenda was the appointment of Deanery Secretary to replace Georgie Black who had left at

the end of the previous year. Paul Moore proposed Anne Stunt to fill the vacancy and this was carried unanimously.

Tony Blackshaw, Diocesan Director of Education and Head of Mission & Education for the Dioceses of Winchester and Portsmouth, gave a very interesting presentation entitled "How can we engage more fully and strategically with our local schools". He and his team look after 145 schools and nearly 31,000 pupils. He pointed out that schools are essentially based on Christian values and by law are required to provide a daily collective act of worship mainly and broadly Christian in content, which is why churches should be involved in serving their local schools. He wanted Synod's support and invited members to contact him directly.

Revd Jonathan Jeffery from Leigh Park & Warren Park proposed a "Good Community Conference", a Deanery-wide event with speakers from Church, politics etc to add to the quality of the communities we live in and this was approved.

Tony Rice-Oxley reported on the Koforidua fund. Money had been received from 12 parishes and a cheque for £1860 would be sent to go towards the palm oil project which was ready for start-up. Paul Moore thanked all the parishes for their involvement but reminded Synod that the total pledged amount was £3870 and parishes should be encouraged to make further donations.

It was reported that the parish partnerships within Kairos were going well and the next phase to be presented at the Diocesan Synod is "Buildings", a way of thinking about engaging in the community and using existing resources. Standing Committee had suggested that a Kairos update should take place at every Synod.

Revd Karen Schmidt from Purbrook reported on the West of Waterlooville development. Outline planning permission had been granted for about 500 houses. The 1st phase was 3 years behind schedule and an ecumenical group, led by the Archdeacon, had been meeting for the past 3 years to monitor the impact the development might have. 2 schools were in the plan and there were hopes for a parish worker and a church school.

Ian Hewitt introduced a Gutter Maintenance Programme adopted by the Diocese of London. He suggested that if there was sufficient interest Synod should ask the Diocese to introduce a similar programme. Synod supported this provided the Diocese had the ability to implement it.

18th September Christchurch, Portsdown.

Revd Wendy Kennedy spoke about her role as Diocesan Secretary and emphasised her willingness to support parishes at grass-roots level by attending meetings and taking part in their discussions. She stressed that the Diocese is not a separate entity but is holding matters in common and in trust with and for all parishes within the Diocese. She mentioned the changes and new structures at Peninsular House and their striving for mission, outreach, education and social responsibility. Wendy saw her role as being in the middle, serving and answering the Diocese. At the request of parishes she was planning to provide central assistance for fundraising and project management and was looking for people who could provide professional help. Questioned if the Diocese was considering employing the services of an architect Wendy explained that the Diocese was generally looking into centralising areas such as church maintenance, legal services, surveying etc. based on the cost-effectiveness of doing so. A Diocesan Library was not going to be restored as it wasn't used and took up too much space and time. With regard to the Budget, Wendy stressed that the parish share is not a tax but a voluntary contribution to share costs and pay for ministry and clergy. She asked for prayers for Kairos to instil more passion into our church life and to pray for faith and trust in God.

Paul Moore spoke about the budget for 2008. He explained that Bishop's Council had looked at the proposed budget and asked the Deanery Finance Committees for comment. It was a standstill budget aimed at maintaining the level of ministry and funding and an increase of 5.45% in parish share would be necessary for the following year to cover rises in the budget. A parish share review group had been asked to look into the calculation system and they had concluded that the current system is the fairest. The socio-economic score (SES), based on census data, ensures that poorer parishes pay less and richer parishes pay more. However, the group recommended a change in the range of the SES to reflect the widening gap between rich and poor over recent years. Figures had since been provided for a new way of calculating the SES and the Havant Deanery Finance Committee recommended that it be introduced over a 3-year transition period. In addition they recommended that West Leigh be given a reduction of Share for 2008, the balance being borne by the parishes of the Deanery. Revd Jonathon Jeffery, Leigh Park, mentioned that Bishop Kenneth and Michael Jordan took pride in the fact that parishes for a number of years have paid in full and on time, but were most pleased that the parish shares were based on a system of fairness.

Representatives for the parish partnerships reported on their various activities and initiatives. For the **Southern partnership, Hayling Island**, Paul Ginever spoke about the plans for the Kairos cluster to get involved in

the childcare and extended schools plans on Hayling Island. For the rest of the **Southern partnership**, Mary Close and Jonathon Jeffery reported on the Pentecost Celebrations and the Pastoral Care Training Day. A Diary leaflet had been produced for worship, courses and social events across the cluster. For the **Northern partnership** Paul Moore informed Synod that a Christian Listening Service in the GP surgery was in its training phase and a pilot scheme would be starting Easter 2008. There were joint youth events, and a vision for combined youth work and marriage preparation. For the **Central partnership** Tony Rice-Oxley reported on joint services and social events. A diary on the churches' website was being planned, youth work took place across the cluster and there were regular meetings of Churchwardens.

The Deanery Pastoral Committee, at their July meeting, had noted with concern the large number of NSMs leaving the Deanery and how dependent parishes were on NSMs. They would bring this to the notice of the Bishop's Council and senior staff. They also felt that it was time to review the Deanery Pastoral Plan (set up 2 years ago) in the light of current events and to make recommendations to the Synod in November.

21st November 2007 - St. Thomas, Bedhampton

The main speaker of the evening was the Revd Paul Kennedy, Diocesan Advisor on Healing (as part of the Mission and Discipleship team). He spoke about our understanding of Healing and Wholeness and stressed the difference between healing and cure. Healing, he said, concerns wholeness of body and mind but not necessarily cure and he referred to the reading for the day where Jesus heals the leper; the leper is cured but also made whole. Paul pointed out that Salvation frees us from all that drags us down whether it be personal problems, sin, relationships, broken communities etc. Salvation is also preparation for death as it frees us from the attachment to life. Hence Healing, Wholeness and Salvation go hand in hand and this can be seen in the church service: at Intercession we pray for anything that is broken, the Eucharist provides transformation through the gifts of Christ and the Dismissal sends us out to bring Healing to others.

The Diocese provides resources for parishes and supports other Healing services and retreats. An Annual Day of Healing and Wholeness for anyone interested in healing as a Christian would take place in May 2008. The Healing Team can be contacted to provide resources for Quiet Days or supporting Healing Ministries. Clergy in particular are also given support.

Finance - At this meeting it was recommended that the Capitation Fee be left at £20 per member to prepare for the Lambeth Conference in July 2008.

Koforidua - Paul Moore expressed his thanks to all parishes who had donated so generously. The total requested for the Palm Oil project was £3,680 of which £2,180

had been collected and £1,000 paid out so far. Of the £3,000 needed for the Stipend Fund £1,260 had been paid in and parishes were now being asked for their second contributions (if not already paid in one lump sum)

Deanery Pastoral Committee - Paul More explained the history and development behind the Deanery Plan and pointed out that the Plan was foundational for the future ministry in this Deanery. It formally set up the three parish partnerships to explore new ways of working together across boundaries. The DPC had used the plan as a basis on which to advise the Synod, the Bishop and the Archdeacon. By 2015 stipendiary posts should be reduced by 2.5. Paul Moore noted that significant changes in relationships had happened within the Parish Partnerships and the DPC would be looking to the Parish Partnerships for grass roots views about any developments in the Deanery.

Lambeth Conference. This will be taking place from 11th to 16th July 2008. The Deanery is asked to host three bishops and spouses. A Deanery event is suggested for Sunday 13th and the Bishops are expected to be involved with the Sunday services in their host parish. The Deanery is expected to raise £600 to support the hosts and meet other expenses. A warm welcome is hoped for the visitors and Revd Ann Leonard has already agreed to host Bishop Francis from Koforidua for this event.

These include:

A calendar and diary which is the ideal reference point for finding out all that is going on at St George's, and any previously announced events that have changed. We try hard to keep the diary up to date. Details of each event include the time and location, and you can click alongside the location to get a map. You can change the layout to display as a diary list or as a weekly or monthly calendar. The Kairos Group churches have worked together to develop the facility for each church to be able to feed Kairos events on to the calendars of each church in the Kairos Group automatically, and the Kairos Group will continue to look at other ways in which we can co-operate to create new website services.

We now have the minutes of PCC meetings available to read on the website, and you can also view the whole of this ACPM report (and last year's too!)

It is now possible to make a donation to St George's on the website by credit or debit card – and also buy a magazine subscription.

We have also developed a comprehensive website for the Waterlooville Music Festival which includes an On-Line box office where tickets can be purchased by credit card. Programmes and posters can also be downloaded from the website and printed out.

Of course every copy of the church magazine is on the website to read, going right back to 1997, and starting 2007 we now include a translation service – select the required language from the choice listed in the box at the bottom of the page, and the text is instantly translated. If you want to find something in a past issue of St George's News then use our search engine – put in the keyword(s) you are looking for and you will get a list of all the relevant pages where your keywords have been found.

There's lots more on the website depending on the time of year – the Lent Group and Easter Services leaflet, the Christmas Services leaflet, posters for the Fete or Bazaar which you can download and print out to display – so please use these many resources whenever you can – where we can save the church from printing something we are also saving money!

There are many other features we can develop in the future if church groups want to use them. Here are some ideas – if you are interested please let us know.

We can set up mailing lists – a single email address will send an email to a group of email addresses in one go. This is already set up for the Waterlooville Music festival committee and has been found extremely useful.

Individuals can have their own St George's News email address. Lots of church members have one already – your St George's News email address redirects to another email address that you specify. Your St George's email address never changes – if you change your main email address you just let us know and we amend the redirect.

Do you have a church rota that you would like on the website. We can set this up for you, and provide you with an easy means of changing it and keep it up to date yourself. Then everyone on the rota can easily check it On-Line, without having to search for a bit of paper.

Any church group or organisation that wants an On-line shopping cart to receive payment for subscriptions, services or goods, please let us know – we can set it up on the website (there are some card handling fees involved).

Some of our younger people – how about taking on a project to produce a podcast, maybe of the band, or of a family service presentation – something

that we can use for outreach and publicity. We have a professional podcasting account with Jellycast that we don't use at the moment and that's designed specifically for high speed audio or video webcast hosting. How about producing a video of church activities that we can put on the website and on YouTube?

Another future project is the possibility of a prayer group forum, if there is the interest and demand. Please let us know of any ideas you may have for ways the website can be developed and improved. If the interest is there, we will try and do it! Contact John Johnson – feedback@stgeorgesnews.org

The new style magazine has now been 'in print' for a little over a year. The size has increased from 29 pages to 35 and individual copies have increased in price from 30p to 35p. Thank you to those of you who are paying £2.00 annually. This does help in our budgeting and means you can 'forget' about finding change until the following year. If you do not already pay annually but would like to, Fiona Ross will be pleased to collect your £2.00.

We believe the magazine has improved, both in appearance and content but we are always open to further suggestions and comments. Sadly, in the latter regard, things continue to be quiet (I reported in the same vein in the last report). The readers' letters page we had planned to commence has not got off the ground due to the absence of readers' letters. It should be mentioned that a local magazine has recently had to cease publication because of lack of input from the congregation. If you do not want that to happen to 'St George's News', then we need to hear from you, please!

It has been clear, from our meetings, that the Magazine Committee would like to see the magazine go further than an 'in house' magazine for Church family members. It is felt that a way of reaching out to people would be to eventually provide a free magazine with a large circulation. The current production is approximately 250, slightly more for festival editions. To be able to increase this to, say, 1000, to be produced and delivered free of charge certainly would not be a straightforward exercise for both technical and practical reasons. However, we do urgently need to increase our distribution. An interim plan is to deliver ten copies at random each month with an invitation to subscribe for regular copies. If you can help with distribution or can encourage a neighbour or friend to subscribe, these will be

of benefit to your Church. The magazine raises approximately £800 per annum for general funds.

To forestall a possible question, surely the Church would lose out then if the magazine was issued free of charge? Not if we can solve the second problem, which is to find a lot more advertisers. The revenue from the advertisements would then not only cover magazine production but hopefully show some profit at the end. It is a huge undertaking but we believe it is possible at some point in the future. Again, we ask your help in notifying Tony or John of any prospective advertisers that are interested or can be approached.
